Dare to Explore Booking, Terms & Conditions form

By this point you should have read through the booking terms & conditions, filled in all the personal information requested on the form, signed it and returned a copy to us. If you have not done this please contact your booking agent to request a copy of this form.

Travel documents, Visas and Tourism Levies

- Your passport must be valid for at least 6 months after the entry date into the country of travel.
- Your passport must have a minimum of 2 blank pages per country you are visiting in order to accommodate VISA / immigration requirements.
- VISAS for most countries in East and Southern Africa are obtainable and payable on arrival at the relevant airport, at a fee of between USD50.00 to USD100.00. However, this is totally dependent on the nationality of the passport holder. Please note that only USD bills issued after 2006 are accepted. Some passports require VISAS for South Africa. Should this be the case, the VISA has to be obtained beforehand, VISA for South Africa will not be issued on arrival.
- Kenya – Only E-visas accepted as from January 2021.
- Depending on the nationality of the passport holder, certain countries have the option for eligible applicants to apply online for a visa, please check your itinerary for the correct information.

Traveling with minors

When traveling with minors (children under 18) you might be required to travel with additional documentation.

What is an unabridged birth certificate?

An unabridged birth certificate is birth certificate that includes the full names of both parents. This certificate can take up to eight weeks to receive after your application has been submitted. This certificate must be presented in English, if the certificate is not in English then a sworn translation from a qualified authority from the originating country is required.

Luggage restrictions

You will travel on the various airlines during your tour, please adhere to their luggage restrictions as specified in your under the Prepare For Your Journey section of your itinerary.

If you have a combination of airlines, use the most restrictive.

Safety:

- Please avoid placing any items of value in your checked luggage

Plastic Bags

Please note that the use of single use plastic bags including zip lock bags are prohibited in Kenya, Rwanda, Tanzania and Zanzibar with more and more African countries beginning to follow suit without much warning. Travelling with plastic bags can result in fines and in severe cases even arrest.

Payments

It is a good idea to carry some cash with you to pay for curios, bar accounts, gratuities etc. In South Africa it is advisable to change your money into South African Rands, as it is the only accepted currency countrywide. This could be done at ATM machines or banks, which are available everywhere in South Africa. When travelling in Botswana, Zambia, Mozambique, Swaziland, Kenya, Tanzania, Zanzibar and even Namibia, it will be easier to carry some cash in USD, but in small denominations. Namibia also accepts South African Rand.

Credit Cards

Visa and MasterCard are accepted everywhere except at African markets where payments are done in cash. American Express is accepted in some places, but not everywhere.

Health

Although Southern and East Africa are generally healthy regions to travel in, we strongly advise that all guests visit their local travel clinic or doctor for the most up to date health regulations for the region they will be travelling to.

The following insurance is necessary but not limited to:

- Malaria
Should you be travelling in a malaria area we strongly recommend you visit your doctor or local travel clinic in order to receive the necessary malaria prophylactic medication.
- Yellow fever
It is compulsory for guests who travel to East Africa to have inoculation against yellow fever and to be able to present proof of this. Please note that inoculation has to be received at least 10 days before entering East Africa.

Communication

As most safari locations are in remote areas communication is not always guaranteed. Although a lot of lodges offer access to Wi-Fi the service is very unreliable. Lines are often down and service is very slow. If communication is critical for you then we strongly encourage you to travel with your own satellite phone and or satellite router to avoid the frustration of not being able to connect.

Electricity

Electricity in east and southern Africa (Botswana, Kenya, South Africa, Tanzania and Zimbabwe) supply is 220/240 volts.



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Important Travel Info

Most plugs are 15 amp 3-prong or 5 amp 2-prong, with round pins. Most hotel rooms have 110 volt outlets for electric shavers and appliances. Hotel rooms have 110 volt outlets for electric shavers and appliances.

Universal adapters and converter kits are widely available in South Africa.

The Type C electrical plug (or Europlug) is a two-wire plug that has two round pins. It fits into any socket that accepts 4.0 – 4.8mm round contacts on 19, centres. They are being replaced by E, F, J, K or N sockets which works with Type C plugs. Type C plugs are generally limited for use in appliances that require 2.5 amps or less.



Used in: South Africa, Botswana, Mozambique & Namibia

The Type M plug has three round pins in a triangular pattern and looks similar to the Indian Type D plug, but its pins are much larger. Type M plugs are sometimes used for bigger appliances in countries that make use of Type D plugs. Therefore, sockets in these countries sometimes work with Type M plugs.



Used in: Botswana, Zimbabwe, Zambia, Namibia & Tanzania

The Type D electrical plug has three large round pins in a triangular pattern. Type M plugs are often used alongside Type D plugs for larger appliances and as a result, some sockets work with Type D and Type M plugs. Type D plugs are rated 5 amps.



Used in: Botswana, Zimbabwe, Zambia, Kenya, Tanzania & Uganda

The Type G electrical plug has three rectangular blades in a triangular pattern and has an incorporated fuse (usually a 3 amps fuse for smaller appliances such as a computer and a 13 amps one for heavy duty appliances such as heaters).
